Firegirl is a young adult, realistic-fiction novel. It takes place in a seventh grade classroom, at a Catholic School in Connecticut. The main character is a seventh grade boy named Tom Bender. Tom is a boy that has a hard time getting attention or standing out in the crowd; he always seems to blend into the background. This is partly because he is afraid to speak up, and he has very little self confidence. Everything in Tom's seventh grade class changes, after a new student arrives. This new student is a girl named Jessica, who has been badly burned in an accident. When Jessica walks into the room, the class does not treat her the way any teacher would hope. The students ignore her because they are frightened by the way she looks, and some students are even disgusted by her. Even one of Tom's friends, Jeff, refused to hold her hand during prayers.

Tom finally gets a chance to stand out from the crowd by sticking up for something he believes in. He becomes so upset by how his classmates are treating Jessica, and he slowly begins to get to know her by spending time with her. Tom begins to feel more strongly about how Jessica deserves to be treated, and he becomes very upset when classmates start rumors about her. Tom faces the conflict: Do I stick up for Jessica and do what's right, or do I stay quiet like I always do?

I felt that this was a great story because it was so realistic, and everyone can relate to Tom in some way. It was so easy to put yourself in Tom's shoes to try and decide what you would do in his position. I enjoyed this story very much because it makes you think about how important it is to be sensitive to others' feelings, and it makes you think about what it means to be a good person.

You'll have to read the story to find out what happens to Tom and Jessica!
